Council Duties – 342.03 subd 4

The duties of the advisory council shall include:

- (1) reviewing national cannabis policy;
- (2) examining the effectiveness of state cannabis policy;
- (3) reviewing developments in the cannabis industry and hemp consumer industry;
- (4) reviewing developments in the study of cannabis flower, cannabis products, artificially derived cannabinoids, lower-potency hemp edibles, and hemp-derived consumer products; (5) taking public testimony; and (6) making recommendations to the Office of Cannabis
- Management.

- Under 342.03, Subdivision 3, paragraph (c): "Meetings of the advisory council are subject to chapter 13D."
- What is Chapter 13D?: Minnesota's Open Meetings Law (OML)
- What does this mean for this body:
 - All Cannabis Advisory Council meetings are open to the public.
 - A meeting occurs whenever a quorum (majority) of the public body is present and discusses official business.
 - In some cases, email may constitute a public meeting when the message contains a quorum of members and involves discussion of council business. (See Minnesota Data Practices Office, Advisory Opinions 13-015, 09-020).

The goal of our legislative recommendations is to strengthen the underlying foundation of Chapter 342 and to build upon the intent of last year's legislation as developed together by legislators and advocates.

Overview

Goals of Legislative Recommendations

- 1. Strengthen our work to ensure a timely and successful cannabis market launch
- 2. Create a framework to regulate cannabis effectively over the long term
- 3. Prioritize public health and safety
- 4. Strengthen social equity provisions that are foundational to Minnesota's cannabis law
- 5. Expand protections for medical cannabis patients and their caregivers and support continuity in access
- 6. Incorporate learnings from other states, particularly as it relates to legal decisions that have adversely impacted market launch

Development of Recommendations

To inform these recommendations, OCM has utilized feedback from:

- Public surveys
- Dozens of engagement opportunities
